15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

The National Education Policy visualizes the integral growth of students through a multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary manner by bridging the diverse fields of Science, Technology, Humanities, Language studies, Commerce, Environmental Studies etc. Under Choice Based Credit Semester System, all UG students are offered an Open Course from an entirely different programme.

Research Seed Money is now given for interdisciplinary projects. In future, more amounts will be allotted to such projects. Centre for Natural Resource Management established to promote research and studies in the field of Environmental Science, Geology and other allied subjects has the focus of multidisciplinary Research

16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

The Academic Bank of Credits has been envisaged to facilitate the academic mobility of students with the freedom to study across the Higher Education Institutions in the country with an appropriate "credit transfer" from one programme to another. As per the UGC Regulations, 2021 F. No. 14-31/2018 (CPP-II) the ABC Project has been implemented successfully where by students, teachers, and staff can utilize the fully functional ABC system. The Academic id was created for UG students of 2021 admission. Around 80 per cent of the identification accounts have been created. These are created in the National Academic Depository (NAD) which requires a registration through institution for each student. The 60 per cent of ABC ids for the students of 2022 UG batch has been completed while the rest of the registrations are on-going. The student id is created in the Digital Locker system of the NAD that ensures easy access, authenticity and safe storage. The college has efficiently implemented the above said regulation. Additionally procedures to attach mark lists to the ids are executed.

17.Skill development:

Christ College, located in a semi-urban background, has tried to incorporate skill based learning into curriculum, especially by focusing on the agrarian background in which the College is situated. The College has developed an Aquaponic unit which will be of huge benefit to the local community. This has also a training

aspect where students are given formal introduction to the science of aquaponics. The Paper Recycling Unit established in the College, apart from being an environmental initiative, also provides parttime employment to students as a part of 'Earn while Learn' Project. Vermicompost unit is functional and has the advantage of providing organic manure made available to the local people.

The College also has an Innovation Room for conducting ample research and to exhibit the findings. The College has an active ED club to promote entrepreneurship among the students. There are many more value added certificate programmes made available to students. Many have direct skill development objectives like: Hazard Analysis and Critical Control Points (Food Technology), Microsoft Office Specialist (Excel 2019), Android Programming, Data Analytics and Visualisation (Dept of CS), Equity Portfolio Management and Trading Strategie, Certificate Course on Excel for Business Decisions, Data Analysis using SPSS (Dept of Commerce), Business Analyst Certification Programme (Dept of Economics), Programming in Matlab (Dept of Mathematics), GIS and Remote Sensing (Dept of Geology and Environmental Science), Statistical Analysis using R (Dept of Statistics)

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

Christ College, located in a semi-urban background, has always placed high value in integrating Indian knowledge systems in education. Located in Thrissur District, which is the cultural capital of Kerala, exactly at Irinjalakuda, known for its cultural hegemony in terms of temple arts like Kathakali, Koodiyattam etc. The College has an Oral History Archive stored in the D-space Repository by the Dept of History. It has a rare collection of indigenous Knowledge in Agriculture which includes early agricultural practices in Kannur district and anecdotes by women farmers, knowledge systems like medieval, practical knowledge on Blacksmith Technology, Indigenous knowledge in Treatment (Ayurveda), Oil Processing etc. College library has a Jnana Udyan (Garden Library) to inculcate the spirit of Gurukula Education and Ecofriendly learning. The College regularly celebrates important days related to National integration and cultural significance.

19. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE): Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

In line with the spirit of NEP, Christ College already implemented OBE from the academic year 2019 onwards. Following important steps are taken in this regard. PEO, PO, PSO and CO are clearly stated which are in line with global standards with local and regional

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relevance and are given to all important stakeholders. The College has purchased software deQ from IPSR for the effective mapping process and to calculate the attainment percentage.

20.Distance education/online education:

In 2016 itself, the IQAC of the College formed an ICT team to promote online education and to integrate it with the conventional teaching- learning process. All students and teachers are enrolled in Moodle LMS. The College ICT team is now equipped to conduct training on Moodle and other online learning resources for neighbouring educational institutions. Coaching for competitive exams like JAM, NET etc are given through Moodle LMS. Christ College configured its own opencourseware portal- Christ OpenCourseWare (https://www.christopencourseware.com/) and programs having all the four quadrants of MOOC education specified by UGC. Foundation courses introduced as a part of Bridge course training are provided in the above portal. A number of valueadded courses are also available in the online mode. College has now two dedicated Youtube channels for education with more than 700 high quality video lectures

As a part of the International Credit Transfer Scheme, students from Indonesian Universities have enrolled in Christ College for their study in selected courses of Functional English in online mode. Students of University of Zululand, South Africa are given coaching in Latex by our Dept of Statistics in online mode. The College has already commenced academic interaction with Foreign Universities. The College has made use of online platforms to connect to its Alumni base and have conducted a series of webinars whereby our present students are given a chance to interact with expert Alumni members.

1.3 - Curriculum Enrichment

The Green College campus is also rich with various flora and fauna.

153 courses in the curriculum are related to universal human values. Besides, the College made value education classes mandatory. Saviskara, an interaction programme with differently-abled students, is celebrated on the college campus to teach social sensitivity.

Professional Ethics

218 courses in the curriculum are related to professional ethics. CSA Club organised a leadership camp. The placement Cell of the

college is also involved in personality development programmes.

2.2 - Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 - The institution assesses students' learning levels and organises special programmes for both slow and advanced learners.

The college has implemented efficient methods to assess the learning levels of the students to organize and provide them with specific programmes for advanced and slow learners. Freshers learn about this along with the college curriculum, various activities, opportunities, and available facilities during the post-admission Student Induction Programme. Marks scored in the entry-level assessment test and qualifying examination are taken into consideration for classifying students as slow, advanced and medium learners.

Assessment of student learning levels involves two methods: direct, which includes a screening test consisting of English, core subjects, and a psychometric test; and indirect, the Student Induction Programme ('Dheeksharambh'). The HOD/Programme Coordinator and the Chief mentor interact with each student during the Student Induction Programme which facilitates the Chief mentor to have a keen understanding of the prior learnings, academic level, and family background of students.

2.3 - Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 - Student-centric methods such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem-solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences:

Teaching learning process is a planned interaction between a student and a teacher that results in behavioral modification. The teaching methods in Christ College are adopted with the vision to cater the diverse sections of learners. Students are taught with the mission that fosters a learning environment which nurtures exploration of various skills and critical thinking about the subject. We adopt student centric teaching-learning methods like Experiential Learning, Participative Learning, Problem Solving Methodologies etc. for enriching learning experiences. All the science programmes and many of the social science programmes integrate practical courses with adequate experiential practice for the students. They also provide platform for participative learning to the students. Moreover, projects, fieldworks, industrial visits, seminars, workshops, hands-on training etc. inculcate among the students the practice and habit of participative learning and problem-solving methodologies. In all

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the PG and UG programmes, there is a compulsory project/dissertation course that provides adequate opportunity to the students for incorporating and practicing problem-solving methodology.

Christ College is at the forefront of incorporating new technologies and educational trends into its pedagogy with the current advancements in the field. The college utilizes a range of ICT hardware to enhance the learning experience. One of the key ICT tools used is the Intelligent Interactive panels integrated with smart boards, Intel PCs, WiFi, and subject-specific software.

Christ College has a dedicated video laboratory equipped with high-definition cameras, a teleprompter, a Chroma screen, a whiteboard, and other accessories for the production of video tutorials. The college has also introduced the innovative concept of a lightboard, which allows for the recording of videos while facing the students.

To cater to the needs of visually impaired students, Christ College has an audio laboratory for the production of audio books. The college also has ICT-enabled classrooms, equipped with interactive panels, cameras, and WiFi.

The Teachers' Diary, an essential tool for faculty members, includes the Academic Calendar and exam timetable, aiding in the creation of teaching plans and maintaining records of daily activities. This detailed planning and adherence strategy ensure the efficient operation of academic processes at the institution.

The Office of the Controller of Examination is responsible for overseeing various examination-related activities,

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including exam announcements, registration processes, evaluation, result publication, and the forwarding of results to the University for the issuance of provisional and degree certificates.

To streamline and modernize these processes, the College has integrated IT solutions, particularly utilizing an ERP software provided by Linways Technologies Ltd. This software includes a fully automated examination module, facilitating efficient management of exam-related tasks. Digital valuation of answer scripts is implemented, enhancing accuracy and speed in the assessment process. The College employs the QnSMART software from IPSR Solutions, an advanced OBE enabled question paper generator, for the creation of question papers.

The internal assessments such as test papers, attendance, seminars, and assignments are conducted digitally through the Linways software. This technological integration not only enhances the efficiency of examination processes but also reflects the College's commitment to embracing digital solutions for a more streamlined and effective educational environment.

INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

4.1 - Physical Facilities

4.1.1 - The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching-learning, viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipments, etc.

The institution possesses adequate infrastructure and physical amenities to facilitate effective teaching and learning. This includes classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment, and more.

- The total constructed area of the college spans 37,185.57 square meters.
- For undergraduate programs, there are 93 spacious classrooms with ample lighting, electric fans, LCD projectors, and speakers. Additionally, the college boasts 32 postgraduate classrooms featuring Intelligent Interactive Panels.
- All classrooms are wifi-enabled with a high-speed internet connection of 200 mbps. The postgraduate classrooms are furnished with Jefferson chairs and appropriate furniture.
- Each classroom is equipped with essential teaching tools.
- The college has established six excellent facilities for recording and live streaming online classes, incorporating video conferencing capabilities, webcams, speakers, and wifi in these live classrooms.
- Furthermore, the college hosts 34 well-equipped laboratories, including those for undergraduate, postgraduate, and research purposes, each adhering to standard safety measures and effluent management protocols.

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- Among them are a Water Testing Lab, Zoology Museum, Geology Museum, Incubation Room, and a Common Instrumentation Lab.
- There are 18 computer labs, all equipped with full power backup and protected by a Firewall.
- The college features an Audio-Visual Centre with mixing and editing facilities. Among the four seminar halls, two are centrally air-conditioned.

 - The Chavara seminar hall, established in 2000 and accommodating 150 chairs, is equipped with mike amplifiers and speakers, available for student use
 - The open hall in the students' corner (New block), established in 2016, serves as a venue for cultural activities in the evening.
 - The institution also boasts a 400m athletics standard track with gallery seating for 15,000, established in 1974 across an area of 20,832 square meters.
 - The stadium pavilion, established in 2018, covers an area of 790 square meters.
 - There is a basketball court (4) made of concrete and mud, established in 1999 and 2020, spanning an area of 2,951 square meters.
 - The football field, with a gallery seating capacity of 3,000, was established in 2012, 2014, and 1957 across an area of 8,470 square meters.
 - Additionally, there are four volleyball courts established in 1956 and 2020, covering an area of 2,414 square meters,

and a netball court established in 2018 with an area of 1,092 square meters.

The college has implemented an e-booking system accessible through its website for reserving seminar halls, auditoriums, and computer laboratories. Both staff and students can utilize this system to book venues for seminars, workshops, and meetings.
